God Designed us to Grow Through Relationships, Jesus Modeled How:

God knew how he designed us, to long for relationships of love, and also how this would be the vehicle for our growth and experience of our faith journey, by how we love one another John 13:34-35. Jesus knew this, and provided a model of relational discipleship, then called us to go and do likewise. Jesus modeled an invitational "come and see" approach. He was intentional in the way that he sought people out and lived life with them. The time he spent with them gave him opportunities to speak into their lives.

More Time With Fewer People Equals Greater Kingdom Impact:
